He received an undergraduate degree in mathematics from Cornell in 1977. He also holds advanced degrees in law and in public policy from the University of Michigan. Former CCW CAAAN Chair Ruth Bleyler '62 has been elected to the NH State Legislature. With 400 members, the NH House is the 3rd largest governing body in the English-speaking world, after the US Congress and the British Parliament. They have 317 representatives per 1 million population, while NY has about 9.

This is a rare opportunity to tour the Diplomatic Reception Rooms in the U. S. Department of State, where the Secretary of State receives and entertains leading figures of the world. The President, Vice President, Chief Justice and members of the President's Cabinet also use these rooms.

Those who have already signed up for the February 10th edition of this tour will be having lunch in the Daniel Webster Dining Room, also located on the Eighth Floor, adjacent to the Diplomatic Reception areas. Total cost of the luncheon will be \$20.00, including coffee or tea and gratuity. There will be no charge for the tour. Those who want to be included in the repeat version of this event during the week of March 10th need to move quickly All who are already on the waiting list for February 10th and for whom we already have the required data are being contacted personally. Cornell Club's Book Award Committee Completes 13th Year of Recognizing Outstanding Juniors at Area High Schools


During the Spring Semester of 2002, the Cornell Club of Washington presented awards to 19 outstanding juniors at high schools in the greater Washington area. The basis of the award continues as it was when it was established in 1989: To be awarded to a junior student of high academic achievement who has demonstrated leadership in the area of community service.

Schools are invited to participate by nominating a member of the current junior class who has demonstrated the attributes of the award. Different criteria are used to select which high schools are invited. The award is used where Cornell has a strong presence to foster that relationship. Alternatively, it is used where a recent drop in interest has occurred. The book award has been used at new high schools to help establish a Cornell presence.

The high schools participating in recent years are: in the District of Columbia, Banneker, St. Albans, and Wilson Senior; in Maryland, Bethesda-Chevy Chase, The Holton-Arms, Walter Johnson, Eleanor Roosevelt, Laurel, Winston Churchill, Richard Montgomery, Thomas S. Wooten, and Montgomery Blair; and in Virginia, T. C. Williams, Lake Braddock, Centreville, W. T. Woodson, Langley, McLean, South Lakes, and West Springfield.

The book awarded to each student is the American Heritage Dictionary, Third College Edition, thumb-indexed, with the Cornell University seal embossed on the front cover. A certificate is presented, suitable for framing, and a bookplate is given. CAAAN members are encouraged to present the awards at the schools' award celebrations in the spring. If you wish to recommend additional schools or are interested in participating in presenting the awards, contact Debbie Rutenberg and Samantha A. W. Peele, the Vice Presidents of CAAAN for DC/MD and for VA, respectively

More than 225 books have been awarded in the thirteen years the program has been active. William Newell, ALS '68, has served as Chair for the past 12 years.
