

The briefing, which will be held in the beautiful Jerusalem Hall, will include a question and answer session with Embassy staff followed by a dessert and coffee reception.

CAAA Raises Library Funds with New Year Gala

On January 24th, Cornell Asian Alumni Association (CAAA) held another successful Pan Asian New Year banquet at Grant Harmony in Chinatown in New York City, raising over \$40,000 to benefit the newly created CAAA Acquisitions Endowment for the Cornell University Library

The CAAA honored Sheryl WuDunn, a Cornell University Trustee who is currently the anchor for Page One, a nightly news program on the Discovery Times Channel. In 1990, Ms. WuDunn and her husband, Nicholas Kristof, a New York *Times* columnist, were awarded the Pulitzer Prize for their coverage of the Tiananmen Square democracy movement. The first Asian-American woman to win the prize, Ms. WuDunn graduated from Cornell with an AB in History, an MBA from Harvard, and an MPA from Princeton University.

The 340 guests, including President Jeffrey S. Lehman, enjoyed the festive 10-course dinner and traditional lion dance.

Listserv Do's and Don'ts

The three e-mail listservs described in the lefthand box allow you to communicate with fellow Cornell Alumni in the Washington DC area, but we've all seen instances of misuse. Please review the purpose of each list and abide by the restrictions reviewed below.

Guidelines for Appropriate Use of DC Cornell Alumni Listservs:

- * Begin each subject line with "CCW:" followed by a clear title.
- * Be considerate of what you say to this large audience. Take one-on-one discussions "off-line" do not send these to the entire list.
- * Don't use html formatting. Cornell.edu listservs will only distribute messages in plain text format. Distribute any graphics via an attachment.
- * Don't send large files or files with attachments—these can clog inboxes.
- * Sign your messages with your name and e-mail address for easy replying.

Prohibited Uses of DC Cornell Alumni Listservs:

- · Advertising and solicitations for commercial services
- · Cold-calling or mass-mailings (aka "spamming")
- · Activities that are illegal or fraudulent
- Uses that inaccurately imply endorsement, approval, or sponsorship by Cornell University, its Office of Alumni Affairs or their officers
- Uses that can be confused with official communications of Cornell University, its Office of Alumni Affairs or their officers
- · Messages of any kind using a false identification
- $\cdot\,$ Posting of obscene materials or use of obscene or vulgar language, hate speech

or harassment, or use of abusive or threatening language of any kind

We expect listserv members to exhibit the same level of respect for others in this forum as in any other Cornell-related venue.
