Professor Blumin Speaks on Streetscapes as Windows

on Modern Culture

Thursday, April 7th, 6:30 - 9:00 p.m. The Charles Sumner School 1201 17th Street, NW

The Cornell Club of Washington invites all alumni and guests to this year's Faculty Speaker event, "The Streetscape in Early Modern Art and Culture," featuring Cornell-in-Washington Program Director and History Professor Stuart Blumin. This event, to be held on Thursday, April 7th from 6:30 - 9:00 p.m., is open to all Cornell alumni and friends, free of charge.

The streetscape emerged as a genre in European painting and engraving during the 17th century in Rome and Amsterdam and by the 18th century had spread all across Europe and even to America. Apart from the pleasure one takes in looking at these fascinating scenes of city streets and squares, there are reasons to examine the appearance and development of the genre itself. Could these streetscapes provide a window for gazing at the early stages of city-based modernization in the Western world?

Professor Stuart Blumin has taught at Cornell for thirty years and directed the Cornellin-Washington program for the last six years. Author of a number of books on American history, Professor Blumin's most recent book, now in press, is entitled, *The Encompassing City: Streetscapes in Early Modern Art and Culture.*

Professor Blumin's presentation will take place in the Great Hall, preceded by an informal reception beginning at 6:30 p.m. in one of the Galleries on the floor below the Great Hall. The Sumner School was built in 1872 by the Freedmen's Bureau under the leadership of General Oliver Otis Howard (for whom Howard University is named). The Sumner School was designed and built of the best materials as a showplace and it was Washington, DC's first public school for emancipated slaves.

Cornell Professor Caron Speaks at Holocaust Museum

Professor Vicki Caron, the Diann G. and Thomas A. Mann Professor of Modern Jewish Studies at Cornell, will lecture on "Prelude to Vichy: Antisemitism in France during the 1930s" at the invitation of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum's Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies on Wed., April 20. A reception follows the free lecture. Dr. Caron is the 2004-2005 J.B. and Maurice C. Shapiro Senior Scholar in Residence at the Holocaust Museum. 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Hans Bethe (1906 - 2005)

The Cornell Club of Washington notes with sadness the death of Cornell Professor Hans Bethe on March 7 in Ithaca. Professor Bethe taught nuclear physics at Cornell for over 70 years and was described in the *Washington Post* as having helped Cornell "become one of the East Coast's centers of physics" and a man who was "perhaps the last survivor of the scientific titans who created nuclear physics and nuclear weapons."

Dr. Bethe was one of the leaders of the Manhattan Project which produced the first atom bombs that ended World War II and a winner of the 1967 Nobel Prize for Physics.

Shortly after winning the Nobel Prize, University, 1967. ©Russ Hamilton/CU Professor Bethe helped establish the Club's Faculty Lecturer program when, as one of the first Cornell faculty to come to Washington for these programs, he

addressed an auditorium packed with alumni and high school students who were hoping to be admitted to Cornell. The Club has had the honor of receiving distinguished faculty speakers ever since.
