CCW's Annual Dinner and Silent Auction

While Washington D.C. celebrates the opening of the National Museum of the American Indian, the Cornell Club of Washington welcomes Dr. Angela Gonzales, Assistant Professor of Development Sociology and affiliate faculty in Cornell University's American Indian Program, as the Keynote Speaker for this year's Annual Dinner and Silent Auction. Professor Gonzales will discuss changes in the use and meaning of the terms "indigenous individual" and "collective identity". She will also discuss the expansion and development of tribal government gaming.



Her interest in the sociological processes underlying development and contemporary constructions of identity in the United States link these

two distinct issues that are the subject of much of her research activity. Dr. Gonzales is an enrolled member of the Hopi Tribe of Arizona, former director of the tribe's Grants and Scholarship Program, and current member of the Executive Committee of the Hopi Education Endowment Fund. She received her Ph.D. in Sociology from Harvard University in 2002.

A cash bar cocktail reception will kick off the evening, allowing guests to browse the items in the Silent Auction and place their bids on this year's most sought-after bargains. Once the Silent Auction closes, Cornellians gather for a plated dinner, followed by the featured presentation, questions and answers, and dessert. Proceeds from the Silent Auction support the Cornell Club of Washington Scholarship Fund, which helps to finance a D.C.-area student's education at Cornell.

Dragon Boat Festival, May 28-29 "Big Red Dragons" Race for CCW

Washington's Fourth Annual Dragon Boat Festival will be held Saturday and Sunday, May 28 and 29, on the Potomac River between the Kennedy Center and Washington Harbor. Come root for CCW's entry, the "Big Red Dragons."

Dragon Boats are 45-feet long, including the dragon's head and tail, and are propelled forward by 20 high-tempo paddlers in each boat and a drummer--a colorful spectacle. With four boats in each race, watch races all day long from 9:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on Saturday. Only Saturday's winners and second-place finishers will race on Sunday, from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Cultural exhibitions, arts and crafts demonstrations and hands-on activities, including traditional Taiwanese Dances and other dance programs are scheduled to start at 11:00 a.m. on both days.

Due to the waterfront construction, this year's activities will be more spread out than previously. The best viewing of the boat races will be along the seawall directly under the Kennedy Center's riverside outdoor terrace. Boat launching and official ceremonies will be at Thompson Boat Center, and cultural activities further upstream from Thompson Boat Center.

Races in 2005 will start from the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge against the current to a point 500 meters further upstream, just below the Thompson Boat Center.

Directions: Fans taking Metro can either walk from the Foggy Bottom Metro Station or take a shuttle bus to the Thompson Boat Center area. Parking alternatives include the commercial lot at the foot of Wisconsin Avenue where it meets K Street, N.W., the Kennedy Center's Garage, or other garages along K Street underneath the Whitehurst Freeway.
