In Memoriam

CCW Monthly Board Meeting

February, 2010: There will not be a regular Board meeting for this February.

Louise M. Russell of Silver Spring, MD, long-time member of CCW, died on May 15, 2009 at the age of 104. Born on her family farm in Crown Point NY, she graduated from Cornell in 1926 with a B.S., followed a year later with a master's degree, and finished off her Cornell education with a Ph.D. She was a renowned entomologist for the United States Department of Agriculture, working from its Beltsville branch. After she retired at age 70 with 48 years of service, she continued to work with the USDA for more than 20 additional years, without pay. She was an expert on aphids and discovered more than 30 insects, many named after her. She wrote often of her research. Louise was the oldest surviving member of the CCW.

Rave Reviews, Supreme Court Justices Greet Cornell Glee Club Performances

The Cornell University Glee Club kicked off its Northeast tour in Washington D.C. with a sold-out performance at the Kennedy Center on Saturday, January 9. The Washington Post, in a rave review which appeared the following Monday, praised the "virtuosic choral sound" of the 142-year-old ensemble. In describing a concert repertoire "as diverse as it was challenging," the Post was particularly complimentary of "masterful readings" of two new works commissioned for the Glee Club from American composer Daniel Kellogg, "Innisfree" and "Winter Lullaby." The Hangovers, the a cappella subset of the Glee Club, also performed a few popular arrangements with "tightly choreographed moves." The concert concluded with more than thirty alumni of the Glee Club joining the current members on stage to sing some traditional songs of Cornell.

After a performance at the Newseum on Sunday, the Glee Club sang with students at Walt Whitman High School in Bethesda on Monday afternoon and performed a concert at Holton-Arms School that evening. In addition, on Tuesday, at the invitation of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg '54, the Glee Club performed a private concert at the Supreme Court of the United States. Justice Ginsburg graciously greeted the students before the concert and was clearly beaming with pride in her alma mater as she introduced the group to a distinguished audience including Justices Samuel Alito and Sonia Sotomayor. Following the performance, Justice Ginsburg talked with the singers about the history of the Supreme Court.

Thank you to the Cornell Club of Washington for helping to publicize the concert at the Kennedy Center, and to so many of you for attending and for sponsoring the Glee Club's visit to Washington. Special recognition also goes to Austin Kiplinger '39 and the Kiplinger Foundation, Joe Manelsky '56 and Dale Lazar '74. Without all of your support, these ambitious, high-profile performances would not have been possible.

Three Sunday Walks Among the Cherry Blossoms

Delivered by Author and Professor Joel L. Swerdlow, Ph.D. '74

Walk #1: Looking for What Abraham Lincoln Called "The Better Angels of Our Nature"

Sunday, March 28, 1:00-3:00 pm Meet at base of the Lincoln Memorial

Route: Lincoln Memorial to FDR Memorial to Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial site

We will re-create a major speech from dedication of the Lincoln Memorial in 1922 (the uncensored version). Learn why Lincoln wanted to enshrine slavery in the U.S. Constitution until the beginning of the 20th century, and examine how Hollywood and television have done so much to change our feelings about the Lincoln Memorial. We will then take the short walk to the FDR Memorial, where we will look for evidence of FDR's greatest failing, which most of his critics still fail to recognize, and his vision of an Economic Bill of Rights. Ending at the site of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, we will discuss how his views about economic justice and war still challenge us. We will also discuss the untruths (or misleading statements) upon which the creators of each memorial relied.

Walk #2: Looking for Power in the U.S. and Finding Public Opinion

Sunday, April 11, 1:00-3:00 pm

Meet in front of the National Archives

Route: National Archives to Constitution Gardens to where Supreme Court should be

On display at the National Archives—and treated as equal in importance to the Magna Carta, Declaration of Independence, U.S. Constitution, and Bill of Rights—are briefs from Marbury v. Madison. We will explore how this case has become one of America's most important conceptual exports to other democracies (hint: central to this story is the death of major civil rights legislation). We will also discuss what the Founders believed about war-making, and why we have not formally declared war since June 5, 1942. Finally, we will try to figure out why, at his confirmation hearings in 2006, now-Chief Justice Roberts refused to say whether Congress can end a war by cutting off funds.

Walk #3: In Search of Peace

Sunday, April 25, 1:00-3:00 pm

Meet near the east end of the Vietnam Memorial

Route: Vietnam, Korea, World Wars I and II memorials to the "Peace Statue" and the site of the future Disabled Veterans Memorial

Thanks in large part to the success of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, war memorials now dominate a large and growing portion of the nation's most respected landscape. How and why this has happened teaches us much about how our democracy works. We will discuss how Maya Lin's undergraduate sketches became one of Washington, D.C.'s most popular sites; why Americans still do not want to know the full story of Iwo Jima; whether the road to peace lies in promoting democracy, and more. At the conclusion of this, the final walk, we will weave all three weeks together in a discussion that seeks ideas and insights.
