
Meet the Conable Stipend Award Recipients

The Cornell Club of Washington recently awarded alumni-funded stipends to two students participating in the Cornell-in-Washington program this spring semester. The stipends help defray the cost of living in Washington, D.C. and the potential loss of income from not being able to hold a work-study job while interning. The awards honor the late Barber B. Conable '43 – a member of the New York State Senate, a United States Congressman from New York, and President of the World Bank – for his contributions to our government, environmental concerns, and international relations. This spring, the Conable Stipend Awards went to two juniors, Jamila Amanfu and Dana Horowitz.

Jamila Amanfu is a junior in the College of Arts and Sciences majoring in Biology and Society. Originally from New York City, Jamila has always been "fascinated with science" and is interested in applying science in the "social context of how it affects people and populations." On campus, Jamila is a member of the Alpha Phi Omega Community Service Fraternity and participates in the "Alternative Breaks" community service program. After graduation from Cornell, Jamila intends to obtain a Master of Public Health degree. Her internship in Washington is with the National Association of Community Health Centers.

Honoring CCW Past Presidents

CCW History

With the March 2017 issue of CCW News, we began a series to honor CCW's 32 Past Presidents. For many years, the Cornell Women's Club and the Cornell Club of Washington (men only) sponsored their own programs and activities. In December 1965, both boards approved a merger agreement, and a referendum vote was mailed to the alumni. The two presidents at the time, Edwin Miller '35 and Lori Eisenberg '50, completed their terms. For the following year (1966-67), Phillip Fleming '52 was elected the first president of the newly consolidated group. Visit www.cornellclubdc.org/history for more CCW history.

One of CCW's most energetic and accomplished former presidents was John Rasmus '63, CCW's 7th president, who held a one year term 1974-75 and was extremely productive during that term. John is a Life Member of CCW, and received the Bondareff Award in 1995. Born and raised in the Rochester NY area, he graduated from West Irondequoit High School in 1959. John applied to Cornell in order to compete for a scholarship offered by his father's company, Loblaws Supermarkets, offered only for employees and children of employees. He received the scholarship and without ever having visited Cornell, he arrived as a freshman.

From freshmen orientation onward, John embraced his Cornell experience with "joy and appreciation." John was a Government major from the College of Arts and Sciences, and he experienced legendary professors such as Clinton Rossiter, Ted Lowi, Arch Dotson, George Fischer and Steve Muller. Forty years later in Washington, D.C., while both were at the same restaurant, he was able to thank Professor Muller for his outstanding, passionate lecture in Comparative Government on the fall of the Nazi regime.

On campus, John served his fraternity, TKE (Tau Kappa Epsilon) as an officer, participated in the Undergraduate Secondary Schools Committee after which CAAAN was based, was President of the CU Young Republican Club, and was chief announcer at WBVR-FM. He then earned a Law degree in 1966 from the University of Virginia and is a retired member of the Virginia State Bar. His first DC job was as a Special Agent with the Office of Counterintelligence and Security Defense Intelligence Agency at the Pentagon. In 1970, he joined the US Savings and Loan League, which evolved into a senior counsel position with the American Bankers Association. John joined CCW in 1970 in response to a mail solicitation and through the encouragement of Esther Bondareff and fellow Cornellian and fraternity brother, Erik Landberg '55. He enjoyed monthly luncheons at George Washington University, phonathons at Erik's Merrill Lynch office and the Club's periodic social events. Esther Bondareff persuaded him to chair the Kiplinger CCW Picnic. He later took on the job of VP of Program and became President of CCW in 1974. John also served as Chair of the Investment and Audit Committee and helped organize the committee when it was formed. John also served as a member of the Cornell University Council for several years.

While CCW President, John was most proud of the Cornellians in Congress Reception and Dinner in 1975 at the Capitol Hill Club. This event was packed as each of the 13 Cornellians in Congress spoke in appreciation of the event. Bob Barlow of Cornell University also helped with that event. These 13 Cornell graduates were honored for their service to the University, their districts and the country. Vice President Carl Johnson '60, a fellow professional lobbyist and Charlotte Conable (CCW Board member and CU Trustee) gave valuable assistance. Among the 13, were Barber Conable, Thomas Downey, Gil Gude, Frank Horton, Norman Lent, Matthew McHugh (Ithaca District), Richard Ottinger, Edward Pattison, Henry Reuss, Howard Robison, Henry Smith III, Ed Muskie and Sam Steiger. Conable, Gude and Smith were particularly active in CCW. Retiring in 2008, after 23 years with American Bankers Association, John and his wife Elaine moved to Kansas City to assist her aging parents. They now live in Lee's Summit, MO, a suburb of Kansas City in a full-scale retirement community of about 1,000. John continues his involvement with Cornell as a member of the Cornell Club of Mid-America's Board of Directors and Chair of that Club's biannual Book Club. Quoting John, "I highly recommend that Washington area alumni, parents of Cornell students and friends of Cornell, join and actively participate in the CCW. The Club is well-organized, has a significant breadth of activities, engages in many service projects to benefit the Washington community, and keeps the Cornell spirit alive and well in Washington. Besides, alums get to engage with a great group of people."

Past Event Highlights

An Evening with Dr. Ryan Lombardi

On February 8th in downtown DC at the CASE building. CCW welcomed Cornell's Vice President, Student and Campus Life, Ryan Lombardi, who oversees campus and student life. The focus of the evening was to discuss four main university priorities: residential life, health and wellness services, career advising and current campus concerns including diversity and inclusion. Attending were intergenerational alumni inclusive of recent graduating classes, Cornell connected staff, parents of

current students, and Cornell in Washington students. The evening began with a welcome reception, during which he met with the attendees. Then, CCW President Terry Horner '92, in a seated interview format, asked him questions that covered topics from his academic background to the priorities he is addressing on campus. A recent news report about fraternity Zeta Beta Tau's CU Chapter was Terry's first question thus allowing him to explain the CU judicial reviewing process and his goals of holding students accountable for what they do, knowing that when mistakes occur they could go instantly onto social media and the press. He said that Cornell tries to be perfect, but cannot always be, and cannot expect its students to be perfect. But improvement must always be practiced.

Another high priority is housing for freshmen and sophomores. He noted that Cornell will be adding 2,000 beds on North Campus in an attempt to give all freshmen and sophomores housing. More importantly, he would like to provide a common experience for freshman and for sophomores who opt to continue in residential university housing in their second year. Also, student mental health and other health issues are a major focus of his job. The current staff of 290 at Cornell Health (expanded from Gannett) includes all GP specialists and mental health professionals. He said health needs are being met in shorter time frames than previously, but the need continues to grow to support mental health services for students. In addition, career services, inclusive of the Breazzano Family Center for Business Education, are growing and the Cornell Public Service Center, linking students with community needs for volunteers, is ever increasing. An audience question and answer followed.
