Honoring CCW Past President

Edwin Mason Miller '35 ALS, '39 Law

Cornell Club Washington (Men) President 1965-66

For many years, the Cornell Club of Washington (men) and the Cornell Women's Club each sponsored separate programs and activities. Between 1964 and 1966, under the leadership of each president, Edwin Miller '35 and Lori Eisenberg '50, a plan was developed to merge the two clubs. On December 6, 1965, both boards approved a merger agreement and a referendum vote was approved by the alumni. In this issue CCW honors Edwin M. Miller '35 ALS '39 Law, who was an "Engaged Cornellian" renewing and expanding Cornell's founding commitment to "knowledge with a public purpose" and who died at the age of 89 on May 11, 2002. Edwin M. Miller was a lawyer and supervisory trial attorney* for 20 years with the Federal Power Commission (FPC) now the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (42 U.S.C. § 7172). The FPC was an independent commission of the United States government originally created in 1920 by the Federal Water Power Act, which provided for the licensing of hydroelectric projects on the land or navigable water owned by the federal government. The FPC also regulated interstate electric utilities and the natural gas industry. Miller's work at the FPC focused on the development of gas pipeline pricing based on overall costs. He was a member on the team of FPC attorneys in seminal law cases argued in the US Court of Appeals regarding the export of natural gas to Canada. Mr. Miller received the Meritorious Service Award upon his retirement from the FPC. Before moving to the Washington area, he was a lawyer with the New York Central Railroad and Iroquois Gas in Buffalo. Mr. Miller was born in Fredonia Upstate New York outside of Buffalo. He served in the Navy in the Pacific during World War II and the Korean War. He was a member of Christ Congregational Church in Silver Spring, MD where he sang in the Choir. He was married to Virginia S. Miller, '39 BA, who also was active in Cornell Alumni affairs and with whom they had one son Howard S. Miller, '67 AB '75 Law, an attorney in Hempstead, NY. As an undergrad, Edwin sang tenor in the Men's Glee Club. He was the general chairman of the 1965 Washington 'Kick-Off' Dinner at the Mayflower where 500 alumni launched the Centennial Fund Campaign with Toastmaster and Cornell Trustee Austin H. 'Kip' Kiplinger '39. Ed served as a member on the Cornell University Council, whose mission is to "make a difference for the entire Cornell community by serving as a catalytic agent who inspires, informs, engages and propels broad recognition of Cornell as one of the top 10 universities of the world."



Homecoming and Zinck's 2019

Homecoming 2019



More than 17,000 alumni, students, parents, staff members, and residents of Ithaca joined in for the 2019 Cornell Homecoming on October 4–5. On Thursday evening before the Homecoming events, President Martha Pollack dedicated a permanent plaque outside Sage Chapel, 52 years later, commemorating the 9 Cornellians who perished in the "Res Club Dorm Fire" of 1967. Among those who perished were three sophomores in Cornell's six-year Ph.D. program: Martha Beck '69, Peter Cooch '69 and Jeffrey William Smith '69. Anne McCormick '67, a senior in the HuEc program, and Jennie Zu

Wei Sun '68, a junior in Arts & Sciences, also died in the fire, as well as English Prof. John Alban Finch, and three graduate students Meimei Chung Cheng, Carol Lynn Kurtz, and Johanna Christina Walden.

The 50th anniversary of the 1969 Willard Straight Hall Occupation also was honored with a permanent plaque during homecoming weekend, which reads:"Cornell was one of the centers of student protest and activism in the 1960s against the Vietnam War and the denial of civil rights in the United States. In April 1969, over a hundred Black students occupied this building for thirty-three hours, bringing to Cornell the national Civil Rights Movement's struggle for racial and social justice. After a peaceful, negotiated ending to the building occupation, Cornell set out to become a leader in its commitment to the ideals of a diverse and inclusive university."



for the Cornell-in-Washington Program. The Barber B. Conable Scholarship is awarded to a student(s) enrolled in the Cornell-in-Washington Program. The scholarship honors Barber B. Conable '43, former Congressman and former President of the World Bank, for his contributions to our government and international relations. This stipend helps defray the cost of living in a major metropolitan area and the student's potential loss of income from being unable to hold a work-study job while living in DC while working in an internship. The CCW Board congratulated Conable awardees, Amina Taariq and Daniel Wrenn at the October 15th Meeting at the Cornell Center in Washington, DC.

Each semester, the Cornell Club of Washington provides two Conable Awards to current Cornell students participating in the Cornell-in-Washington (CIW) program. Each Conable Award recipient receives up to \$750, which is funded by the generous donations of DC-area alumni. The award helps students defray the increased costs of spending a semester in DC and away from work-study opportunities that are prevalent on Cornell's campus in Ithaca. Students are selected based on their academic achievements, service commitment, and contributions to Cornell life.

Aminah Taariq is a junior in the Cornell University College of Agriculture and Life Sciences double majoring in Environment and Sustainability and Communications. She grew up in Poughkeepsie, NY and attended Oakwood Friends School. At Cornell, Aminah is a member of the Student

Puppy Plogging at Carter Barron



On Saturday, October 5th the Cornell Club of Washington joined the Rock Creek Conservancy, Mayor's Office of the Clean City, and the National Park Service for "Puppy Plogging" as they removed trash from the Carter Barron area of Rock Creek Park. The word "plogging" is derived from the Swedish words for jogging and picking up litter. Volunteers (and their dogs) helped remove trash from the Carter Barron area in support of Mayor's Office of the Clean City's Pet Waste Campaign. Gloves and poop bags were provided, and dogs were kept on leash. Trash and

dog waste are two of the biggest threats to the City in general and Carter Barron, one of the Rock Creek Conservancy's five "mini-oases" and focus restoration sites.

Bamboo Removal - Melvin Hazen West



An "oasis in the city" needs our help! On October 26th, 2019 the Rock Creek Conservancy, the National Park Service, and the Cornell Club of Washington DC joined together to remove invasive bamboo from one of our "mini-oases", the western section of Melvin Hazen at 3031 Sedgewick Street, NW Washington, DC. In 2019, the Conservancy is focusing its restoration efforts on five "mini-oases" in Rock Creek Park in the Rock Creek Watershed. The popular Melvin Hazen Mini-Oasis can be found in the Western section of Melvin Hazen Park in NW Washington, D.C. near the Cleveland Park Metro. The site gets its name from the tributary

that runs through the park and flows into Rock Creek. This site needs a significant amount of invasive plant work to restore the forest understory. These areas have been strategically chosen because they are important to the health of Rock Creek as well as to the communities that live near them. Invasive species like bamboo are among the biggest issues plaguing this urban park. The area currently houses a large variety of invasive plant species including an almost 100% distribution coverage of groundcover English ivy. The site also features bush honeysuckle and a large swath of bamboo directly south of the community garden. With proved tools and gloves volunteers helped remove invasive bamboo from a section of Rock Creek Park behind the World War II Victory Garden in the western section of Melvin Hazen Park.
